### Breast Cancer kills the poor more than anybody else

For most people in the developed world, it is inconceivable to think about someone living on less than \$2 a day. That reality is not far removed from where IHDN serves in Ghana. Majority of the people are poor and live on less than \$2 a day. Food, clothing and shelter are top most on their minds. Cancer Care is the last thing to think of. Yet they are not exempt from a cancer diagnosis.

A woman with a breast lump in a village will have to choose between buying food or visiting a doctor. Invariably, she delays in going to the doctor until the lump grows bigger. If it is cancerous the lump will also ulcerate the breast. Then she runs to the doctor. This is the story of most of the women we see with cancer of the breast in Ghana.

We are continually educating the community on early diagnosis and treatment of breast cancer. Our hospital staff had extensive outreach programs to the Ketu North and Ketu South Districts this past October. Our pathology laboratory continue to help with timely diagnosis.

We thank all of you who are working with us to improve on breast cancer care in Ghana. May God bless you.

**Thank God for the 45th Mission trip to Ghana - January 30 to February 22, 2025**

We completed our 45<sup>th</sup> Mission trip to Ghana from January 30 to February 22, 2025. The team was made up of the following:

We were assisted by a Ghanaian medical, surgical & nursing team, made up of 5 doctors, Dr. Nelson Agboadoh Surgeon, Dr. Henry Kpeli, Obstetrics & Gynecology Resident. Dr. Abigail Fowota, Dr. Elliot Adu-Brobberry and 3 Physician Assistants (PA) – PA Wisdom Vidzah, PA Paul Komashie, PA. Daniel Agbele and the clinical and non-clinical staff of the hospital. We also recruited nurses, and nurse anesthetist from Ghana to join the team.

We treated over **2,034** patients in **19 days** at the out-patient clinic. About 65 % of these patients were women. Most of them were younger than 50 years. The major focus of this trip was Surgical and Cancer Care. Ninety-five surgeries were performed. The two commonest surgeries were Hernia repair (32 %) and Excision of soft tissue tumors and breast biopsies (28%). Other types of surgeries done are Cesarean Section, Myomectomy, Hydrocelectomy, Mastectomy, Thyroidectomy, Laparotomy, Hysterectomy, Appendectomy, Parotidectomy, Splenectomy. Several patients had malaria, hypertension and Musculo-skeletal disorders. Once again, we saw a few patients with various stages of breast cancer and prostate cancer. We thank all who donated, prayed and supported us on this trip. May the Lord richly bless you.

**IHDN Hosts the 12th Annual Fundraiser Dinner**

Our 12th Annual Fundraiser Dinner called “Bringing The World Together” on June 6, 2025 was attended by 255 guests. The goal was to raise \$150,000 to complete the Multipurpose Pathology Laboratory building, Morgue, and the Women and Children’s Health Center at Worgbato. Over \$108,781 has been raised. We thank Hope Church for supporting us over the years and in particular in this event. We also thank all who volunteered and contributed financially. May God bless you for your generosity.

**Pathology Laboratory Services continue to grow**

Our histotechnologist, Ms. Joyce Agormedah and Mr. Johnson Dogbe, have processed 136 specimens from January to October 2025. This compares with 28 specimens processed during the same period in 2024. Most of the specimens processed were from breast biopsies, thyroidectomies and Uterine specimens. We reviewed a few abnormal peripheral blood smears. With this review, we were able to diagnose 2 patients with Chronic Myeloid Leukemia. One of them was referred to Accra for appropriate treatment and she is doing very well. The other one never went for treatment. The availability of this service at the hospital makes pathological diagnosis readily available and more affordable to rural patients. They do not need to go to Accra or other major cities for care. We are hoping to grow the pathological diagnostic services including the addition of a morgue. We thank Dr. Nagendra, for volunteering his time to review the specimens sent to him.

We made donations of Pathology and Hematology Text books to the departments at Korle Bu Teaching Hospital, Accra.

## IHDN completes 46<sup>th</sup> mission to Ghana from July 17 to August 2, 2025

We completed our 46<sup>th</sup> mission trip to Ghana from July 17 to August 2, 2025. The team included

We treated 979 patients over 11 days. We were joined by Dr. Nelson Agboadoh, a volunteer Ghanaian Surgeon, who performed surgeries on 53 surgeries. Most of these were Hernia repair (26%) and excision of Soft tissue tumor (32%), Thyroidectomy (13%) and Cesarean Sections (11%). Other patients required hydrocelectomy and parotidectomy.

### Health & Development Institute

Under this program, we hosted a 5-day workshop for 27 students, recruited from Weta Senior High Technical School, Weta; Some Senior High School, Agbozume; Anlo Afiadenyigba Senior High School, Anlo Afiadenigba; Klikor Senior High School Technical School, Klikor and Dr. Adlise Porter AME Zion Vocational/Technical Training Institute; Satsimadza

The lead teachers for this program were Mrs. June Agamah, Mrs. Kai Pollard, Mr. Antoine Pollard and Ms. Sheila Perry. They were assisted by Dr. Sanjai Nagendra, Ms. Kai Pollard and Ms. Nikita Nagendra. They focused on Christian Values and Identity, Finding your Purpose and Making Life's Decisions, How to set up and grow your own Business, Computer Science, English, Mathematics, Biology and Physiology. We provided transportation and two daily meals for all these students during the training session. The students were very enthusiastic and learned a lot. Students, who distinguished themselves, were given the opportunity to participate in our summer internship. The long-term goal is to help guide them to achieve their full potential.
